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Good Practices in the INTERREG Europe Programme





As a 'capitalisation' programme, Interreg Europe is primarily targeted at local and regional public authorities and focuses on the identification, analysis, dissemination and transfer of good practices and policy experiences, with a view to improving the effectiveness of regional and local policies.

Definition within the INTERREG Europe Program

Good Practices is defined as an initiative (e.g. project, project, process, technique) undertaken in one of the programme's priority axes which has proved to be successful in a region and which is of potential interest to other regions. Proved successful is where the good practice has already provided tangible and measurable results in achieving a specific objective.




UpGradeSME learning

The relationship is based on **trust** in the Dutch, Basque and German regions.

Good Practice is the cooperation of Steinbeis-Europa-Zentrum and the Ministry for Economic Affairs, Labour and Housing Baden-Württemberg.

In Hungary and Romania we are working on establishing this level. First initiative was the kick-off meeting which enabled a first step of the multilevel governance.
